

SYNOPSIS

WILLIAM TELLS THE STORY OF A NINE-YEAR-OLD TORN FROM HIS FAMILY IN 1960 AND PLACED BY FORCE IN ONE OF 139 INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS THAT EXISTED IN CANADA OVER A PERIOD OF A HUNDRED YEARS.

Each episode highlights one typical scene in the children's journey through the system, from their life on the land to their abduction by government agents, their arrival at the school, their experience in the dormitory, the classroom, and their return home. **WILLIAM**'s six episodes allow the user to live this dark chapter of Canadian history in the first person.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This series renders reality in its most intimate form by means of a fictional work grounded in historical fact. In its development, **WILLIAM** benefited from the same rigor that goes into making any truthful documentary. Much research went into developing and designing the six episodes.

The scenarios are based on the testimonies of residential school survivors. Scenes were selected to capture the archetypal moments that every child who went through the residential school system had to live out. The experience of William and his peers is the experience of thousands. By living it, we bear witnesses to a tragedy that was repeated each time the government abducted a child from family or their community.

This project is part of a movement trying to raise awareness and repair the harm done to Canada's Indigenous communities. It is doing this by putting the power of cinema and virtual reality in the service of education and awareness.

By embodying a character and living their story, the user actively participates in a movement that amplifies empathy and the desire to understand the experience of others.

But since Canada's colonial legacy is just one instance of the global issue of colonization, the series is part of a worldwide effort to recognize the experience of Indigenous peoples around the world. SONIA BONSPILLE BOILEAU

Sonia is a bilingual filmmaker of Kanien'kehá:ka-Quebec origin who has worked with Nish Media for over fifteen years to create Indigenous television and film content for audiences of all cultural backgrounds.

She is the recipient of a Gemini Award (Last Call Indien, 2011), the APTN Award of Distinction (2016) and the Women in the Director's Chair Feature Film Award (2017). In addition to creating several youth and documentary works, including The Oka Legacy (2015) and Wapikoni (2018), she has written and directed two fiction feature films, Le Dep (2015) and Rustic Oracle (2019).

Bonspille Boileau has written her first drama series, Pour toi Flora (2022), broadcast on Radio-Canada.

"The process surrounding this virtual reality project was inspired by my grandfather and his sisters' long stay in a residential school for Indigenous people. This experience had a profound impact on my family and my identity in such a way that it has coloured my entire creative journey and is a testament to my desire to connect with the culture that the residential school took away from my forefathers. WILLIAM is part of a process of healing and coming to terms with the past, in an effort to share through which I wish to deliver the real in its most intimate form."

Jason Brennan is a proud member of the KitiganZibi Anishinaabeg community and President of the Gatineau-based Indigenous filming production company Nish Media. Since 2005, Nish has produced over hundred hours of documentaries, dramas and children's programming for several Canadian English and French language channels. The movie *Le Dep*, *Rustic Oracle* and *L'Inhumain* have all been released in Canadian cinemas and selected for some of the world's most prestigious film festivals. Most recently, Brennan produced the mini series (6) *Pour toi Flora*, the first Indigenous written, directed and produced drama for the Radio-Canada, CBC. The series has been available since May 2022.

A WORD FROM THE PRODUCER

"In spring 2015, I started working on WILLIAM; on a VR project that would allow people to move from a passive to an active mode; from the status of viewer to the status of user.

In fact, I wanted to use VR to work on a subject as sensitive as Canadian residential schools. In my opinion, virtual reality can succeed in democratizing a topical subject in order to contribute to the enrichment of our community."

From high level television documentaries, internationally successful television drama and even feature films, Nish is committed to producing some of the best Indigenous content around the world. Comfortable in English, French and some of Canada's Indigenous languages, we have a high degree of versatility, allowing us to tell the stories we want to tell - and to do it differently. Nish Media is focussed on giving filmmakers their own voice and the means to create compelling content on a wide variety of platforms. The topics covered to date have been explored from a new angle and with the goal of leaving an imperishable memory for viewers, which is the core objective of our production company. We have produced several television series as well as unique pieces for various channels such as APTN, IRC, TV5, CBC, Canal D, PBS and our productions have travelled across the globe.

In 2015, Nish Media started to produce feature films with "Le Dep", a film by Sonia Bonspille Boileau. The micro-budget movie was presented in several cinemas in Quebec and across Canada and was chosen by some of the world's most prestigious film festivals. Two more films have since been produced and released, « Rustic Oracle » and « L'Inhumain ». Most recently Nish Media produced "Pour toi Flora" ("Dear Flora") its first drama series, written and directed by Sonia Bonspille Boileau. This six-part series, which tells the story of an Anishinaabe family torn apart by Residential School, is currently airing on Radio-Canada and APTN and has been nominated for awards at the La Rochelle Drama Festival and at MIPCOM for the Diversify TV award.
